SPOTLIGHT ON Col. Elmer Jones, USAF (Ret.) AN ORIGINAL TUSKEGEE AIRMAN

As one of three graduates of the Howard University Primary Civilian Pilot Training program selected for advanced flight training, Elmer Jones was sent to Tuskegee Institute, Alabama in the summer of 1940 to be a student pilot in the first black Secondary Civilian Pilot Training program.

In February 1941, the Army Air corps offered Jones an opportunity to participate in Aviation Cadet training as a non-flying officer. He reported to Chanute Field to join five other black aviation cadets, to be trained as Technical Officers for the 99th Fighter squadron.

After six months of class and shop instruction, the cadets were transferred to the Tuskegee Army Flying School for three months of hands-on experience. Shortly after the attack on Pearl Harbor, Jones was immediately commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant, trained in the specialty of aircraft repair and technical supply.

Jones became Commander and Engineering Officer of the AAF Service Detachment # 99,

and shipped overseas with the 99th Fighter Squadron in April 1943. The Detachment performed essential services for the Squadron until it became a part of the 332nd Fighter Group. When the 332nd and the 96th Air Service Group arrived in Italy, the 366th Squadron of the 96th was assigned to service the 332nd with Major Jones in command.

After returning to the United States, Jones served in a variety of positions, including Base Director of Maintenance and Supply at Lockbourne Air Force Base in Ohio. He earned his MS degree in Electronics from the University of Illinois and an MBA degree in Research & Development (R&D) Management from the University of Chicago Graduate School of Business. After several years of service in R&D assignments, Jones was transferred to Air Force Headquarters on the staff of the Assistant Chief of Staff for R&D.

Col. Jones retired from the USAF in 1970 and was appointed Assistant Commissioner for Telecommunications as a senior level, GS17, General Services Administration, where he worked until retirement in 1980. Col. Jones is an active member of the East Coast Chapter.

SPOTLIGHT ON James W. Pryde AN ORIGINAL TUSKEGEE AIRMAN



James W. Pryde

James W. Pryde, an original Tuskegee Airman, was recently recognized by the National Museum Foundation, Inc. (of which Mr. Pryde is a Board Member) for his work as a Cryptologist with the National Security Agency (NSA), then, the Armed Forces

Security Agency (AFSA). The following are excerpts from the Foundation's publication:

Mr. Pryde credits his successes in life to his parents and extended family, his education in the District of Columbia's segregated school system, and to his Tuskegee Experience. That Tuskegee Experience began in 1941, when he entered the Army Air Corps at the age of seventeen as a pre-aviation cadet. He was sent to Keesler Field, MS, for basic training and testing. The 477th was in need of combat crewmembers, not pilots. Pryde was selected to attend radio operator school to send and receive Morse code and perform first echelon maintenance on electronic equipment of multi-engine aircraft.

When the war ended, Pryde was sent to gunnery school, then to work on the flight line as both a radio mechanic and an aircraft radio operator. He was assigned to Squadron Q, the

Negro Squadron. On that assignment, he received an Army Commendation medal. Mr. Pryde relates that the two white soldiers who shared the medal and were awarded theirs on the Post Parade Ground. His medal came to Squadron Q in a plain brown bag.

He was given a confidential clearance in gunnery school to work on the electronic gun sight and a secret clearance to work on the P-63 night fighter. With these clearances and his experience, he was prepared for and employed at the AFSA. He became an intelligence analyst studying satellite photographs. During the 1962 Cuban Missile Crisis, he identified the hidden communications vehicle equipment which helped show that Soviet missile sites were being built within 90 miles of Florida.

He furthered his career by working with electronic and signals analysis, becoming a member of the Scientific Intelligence Committee, a senior analyst assigned to work with missiles and space activities on the Guided Missiles and Astronautics Intelligence Committee. He culminated his career becoming Director of the NSA/DIA Defense Special Missile and Astronautics Center. He was also the National Cryptologic Representative to the OSD and the JCS. He retired in 1980 as the Agency Assistant Deputy Director. Mr. Pryde is now an active member with the East Coast Chapter's Speakers' Bureau.

Michigan Senator, Carl Levin, introduced bipartisan legislation to authorize the awarding of the Congressional Gold Medal collectively to the Tuskegee Airmen. He stated, "The Tuskegee Airmen were not only unique in their military record, but they inspired revolutionary reform in the armed forces, paving the way for integration of the armed services in the U.S." Senator Levin was proud to say that "155 Tuskegee Airmen originated from my state of Michigan." The Congressional Gold Medal is the highest expression of national appreciation for distinguished achievements and contributions.

Lemuel Rodney Custis



Lemuel Rodney Custis, the last surviving member of the first Tuskegee Airmen Flight Class 42-C, passed away on February 24, 2005, in West Hartford, CT. He received full military honors at his funeral, to include a flyover by the CT Air National Guard.

The *Hartford Courant's* headlines read "Lemuel Custis Dies; Leader in Black Achievement," and "A Humble Man who Loved his Country."

Custis was assigned to the 99th Fighter Squadron, flying 92 combat missions in the P-40, shot down a German Focke-Wulf 190 fighter off the Anzio beachhead, receiving the Distinguished Flying Cross for heroism. As stated by Dr. Roscoe C. Brown, Jr. at his funeral, "If he and the four others from that

class had not been successful 63 years ago, the rest of us would never have been airmen." Custis became an advanced flight instructor at Tuskegee and left the US Army Air Force in 1946 as a Captain.

He graduated from Howard University in 1938 and was the first black police officer hired by the City of Hartford before joining the Tuskegee Airmen. He later became the Chief Examiner in the State Sales Tax Division. His achievements were recognized in 2001 by Central Connecticut State University with an Honorary Doctorate of Humanities Degree.

At his funeral, tributes from Tuskegee Airmen, Hartford area friends and co-workers were overwhelming. He left an impressive legacy in his quiet achievements, paving the way for African Americans now in Connecticut's most prominent state and local positions. He was predeceased by his beloved wife, lone.

Victor Hancock



Victor Leslie Hancock passed away on March 8, 2005 in Washington, DC. He became a member of the Tuskegee Airmen and received his commission and pilot wings at the

US Army Air Corps Flying School in Tuskegee, Alabama in 1945, becoming a B-25 bomber pilot.

Following WWII, Hancock received a B.S. degree in 1950 and a Doctorate of Dental Surgery in 1960, both from Howard University. He practiced dentistry in Washington, DC, from 1960 to 1996 and served as an assistant professor at Howard's College of Dentistry, being instrumental in helping countless numbers of young men and women complete

the process of applying and being accepted into the Dental School. He was awarded for being the "outstanding professor" of the year for multiple years and contributed to many civic and professional organizations in the Washington, DC area.

His extensive interest in science was evident in his publications on Air Cooled Internal Combustion Engines at Tuskegee Army Air Field and other dentistry related publications with the Howard University Press.

He remained devoted to the Tuskegee Airmen throughout his life and was an active member in the East Coast Chapter, TAI. His family took great pride in his professional accomplishments and his warmth as a loving, caring husband, father and friend. He is survived by his loving wife, Elaine.
