Ira James O'Neal, Jr. was recognized by the National Capital Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America, Roots of Scouting, Inc. for his 70 years (since 1934) of service and honor to scouting.

Spotlight On Dr. Alan Gropman



Dr. Alan Gropman has been a long-standing and active member of ECCTAI, lending support and credibility that has enhanced our organization, and he is a recognized expert and authority on the history of Tuskegee Airmen. Dr. Gropman is the Chairman, Grand Strategy Department, National Defense University, Industrial College of the Armed Forces.

On April 3, 2004, Colbert I. King, columnist for the Washington Post, wrote an article on Dr. Gropman, following the senseless killing of 21 year old Terrence Gathers in Washington, DC. Dr. Gropman is founder and director of a 13-year-old tutoring and mentoring program at Van Ness Elementary School in Washington,

DC, and has supplied Van Ness with computers, computer instructors, other necessary school supplies, equipment, and thousands of dollars.

The latter may seem a bit unusual for a man with Dr. Gropman's professional credentials, "a distinguished professor of national security policy," states King. Yet, Terrence Gathers was one of Dr. Gropman's students, guided through the mentoring programs. The article goes on to say that Dr. Gropman is "heartsick" about the killing.

The East Coast Chapter shares his feeling since many of our members work with the area's youth in our aviation program and other endeavors. We applaud your work, Dr. Gropman, and are proud to have you as a member of our Chapter.

Record of the Past: June 1937 - A Race with Death

The following excerpt was taken from the *Amityville (NY) Record* in celebration of their Centennial Year:

12:25 pm, Dr. Paddock, of Greene Avenue, present and requested the ambulance to take one Nancy Leftenant, of North Washington Avenue, Amityville, to Southside Hospital, at Bay Shore. A Welfare case. Communicated with Capt. Schlosser at 12:40 pm, and he refused permission to use ambulance.”

The ambulance did, eventually, pick up the young Miss Leftenant, who was in grave condition suffering from a ruptured appendix and under Dr. Paddock’s care. However, she did not go to Southside Hospital where the ambulance should have taken her because they refused to accept her, as did three other hospitals, who reported crowded conditions. She was taken to Reed General Hospital, a private hospital, where she was accepted without question...however 27 hours had elapsed. An investigation by *The Record* disclosed that the facts warranted no criticism of the manner of regulating the use of the Amityville ambulance and non-acceptance by three area hospitals.

“Our Nancy” recounts that she weighed 110 pounds when she entered the hospital that afternoon and was discharged, three weeks later, weighing 85 pounds. The family was not on welfare because her father was a firm believer that his children were his responsibility. The surgeon, Dr. Reed, who accepted Nancy’s case, charged nothing for the operation in his hospital. “It was a 2-story house,” states Nancy, “with no elevator. He had a giant of a man who carried the patients from their room to the operating room. It’s amazing how far we have come since 1937.”

Editor’s note: For those of you who have not had the pleasure of knowing Dr. Nancy Leftenant-Colon, she served in the US Air Force Nurse Corps, working closely with many of the Tuskegee Airmen flight surgeons. She has been a member of Tuskegee Airmen, Inc., ECCTAI, since 1973, serving as National President from 1989-1991.

Herb Jones, Aviation Pioneer



Herbert H. Jones was recognized at College Park Museum for his 60+ years of contributions to the aviation community. His flight school, Cloud Club

II, has conducted flight training for Morgan State University, the Tuskegee Airmen Youth in Aviation (YIA) Program, and orientation flights for the National Black Coalition of Federal Aviation Employees. His alumni now include commercial airline and Air Force pilots.

Herb took his first airplane ride in 1935 and began flight training in 1943 in the Civilian Pilot

Training program in Chicago, IL. He took advanced flight training at Moten Field in Tuskegee, AL. After serving in WWII, Herb received his commercial license and Certified Flight Instructor rating. He then had a distinguished career with the US Department of Commerce Patent Office.

A devoted member of his community, Herb has worked to make the dream of aviation a reality for hundreds of youth. “Watching them (African American youngsters) solo for the first time,” Herb says, is one of the biggest thrills in his life.

They Also Served: The Japanese American Connection

There we were seated among more than a thousand Japanese Americans from babes in arms to elders using walking canes. My father, Woody Crockett, had been invited by the University of Arkansas at Little Rock to share his experiences serving in a segregated army unit during World War II at *Camp Connections: A Conversation about Civil Rights and Social Justice in Arkansas*. The conference was organized by UALR and the Japanese American National Museum. Although the central focus was on Japanese American internment during the war, especially at the two camps in Jerome and Rohwer, Arkansas, the conference also included the experiences of African Americans and Arab Americans.

Daddy spoke about his experiences as a Tuskegee Airman on a panel with Edward H. Ichiyama, Esq., a veteran of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team and the 522nd Field Artillery Battalion. Mr. Ichiyama participated in the celebrated "Lost Battalion" campaign in which the 442nd suffered more casualties than the number of persons they were ordered to rescue. He was also instrumental in researching documents needed to upgrade Distinguished Service Cross medals to Medal of Honor for a number of Japanese American veterans.

Senator Daniel Inouye (D-Hawaii) was present for the entire conference and was praised by the organizers and participants for his efforts and accomplishments on behalf of Japanese Americans, American Indians, and African Americans. During his keynote address, Sen. Inouye spoke movingly of how he joined the army from relative freedom in Hawaii, while many others joined from the internment camps, fighting while their families were still confined under armed guard in the U.S. Throughout the conference, voices tremored with suppressed anger, shame, outrage, and determination, an emotional reminder that injustice is not restricted to any one group of people.

A Visit to Ramitelli Headquarters

Bill and Judy Holton spent several days in April exploring the historic site of Colonel B. O. Davis' 332nd Fighter Group Headquarters that was established in May 1944 at Ramitelli Air Field on the east coast of Italy, near the municipality of Campomarino.
